How would I feel packing up my belongings and moving to a new country where I either do not speak the language and/or do not feel confident conversing with others? If I am honest, I would feel quite scared and lonely. That is why I admire the individuals we engage with at our Conversation Classes across Lincoln City Foundation, as many have done just this.

Could I confidently form a sentence in another language or answer someone's question? The answer is no, unless my now patchy memories of GCSE French could save me! I admire the multilingual abilities of the individuals we work with and their dedication to learning a second (sometimes third or fourth!) language.

Prior to starting work at Lincoln City
Foundation, I had a few friends who were
Polish, but I must admit my experience of
working with international communities was
quite limited. Being involved in the delivery
and development of Conversation Classes
in the local community over the past four
years has completely changed this. It is an
experience that I have both enjoyed, and
which has helped to develop me personally.

In my time teaching, I have assisted mainly advanced learners, supporting them to feel confident in conversational English and developing their self-belief to progress onto

further opportunities, be that employment, community volunteering or simply feeling more able to engage in British life. One of the joys of this role has been watching people as they progress from attending their first class and often being quite shy, to a few months later receiving a request for a job reference, or them telling me they have gained a volunteer placement. I have personally learnt so much about different countries and cultures, and it has made my understanding of the world far richer.

In my time at Lincoln City Foundation, I have also witnessed our Conversation Class offer develop significantly. Our initial one class a week has now grown into a full weekly programme across multiple classes, utilising both face to face and virtual delivery, and we also offer further support to the international parent networks connected to both local primary schools. Our classes have offered further work experience and placements to students studying at both the University of Lincoln and Bishop Grosseteste University, and multiple other community volunteers have also supported our sessions.

I now love walking into our Conversation Classes and seeing a room filled with different cultures connecting and learning together. I know we are helping to facilitate people change their lives and look forward to continuing together on this journey.



// VOLUNTEER STORY //

ANNE

Hi I am Anne. I grew up in Kingston-upon-Thames, went to the local girls' grammar school and went on to Oxford Brooke's university to study Automotive engineering. After I graduated I got a job at the BMW/ Mini plant in Oxford and spent 10 years there working in logistics and supply chain planning (basically working out how to get bits from the supplier to the factory in one piece and on time!).

In 2005 my partner, Dylan, and I bought a little house in central Brittany and spent our holidays over the next few years visiting and starting the renovation work. At the top me the house had no electricity, no bathroom or anything that we get used to in normal life. We made the permanent move over here in 2012 and have continued making (slow) progress on the renovation work. We do now have electricity but the 'temporary' bathroom is outside which can be interesting in the winter (we were without a shower for a week last year as the water frozel).

In the nine years we have spent living in France we have picked up the language to a reasonable level, although I don't think either of us would describe ourselves as fluent, we can hold a conversation and deal with most of the admin that comes with French life. I'd did a TEFL (teaching English as a foreign language) qualification not long after we moved but never did anything about making

further use of it until my Dad remembered I'd done it and volunteered me to help with the Lincoln City Foundation English language lessons that he had been doing via zoom.

I hope that the fact that I am in a similar situation to the students (living in a foreign country tying to do things in another language) has helped me connect with them as we have something in common. I can empathize with how difficult the last 18 months have been, not only being separated from family and unable to travel to visit but also being more cut off at home with less chance to practice the language, I am certain my French skills have worsened as I am not using or hearing the language as much.

One thing I realised soon after moving was that that you need to have the confidence to just go out and use whatever language skills you have, you won't improve if you rely on other people to do everything for you. Learning a new language, especially as a adult, is really hard but never write yourself off as too old (Dylan had never learnt a language in his life before we moved, he's now able to converse in French with people about all sorts of random things!). Hopefully our hour per week is giving the students a bit more confidence in their English skills so that they can go out and put it to more use and move on with their future lives and careers that they would like to do.'
